OUR FOUNDER

We would not be here if it were not for Cal Johnson. Growing up in an orphanage. Cal learned the importance of providing a safe place for youth. He credits the support he received during his youth as what enabled him to succeed as a graduate of the University of Southern California. First Lieutenant in the Air Force, and real estate development investor.

In 1998 Cal was introduced to the Boys & Girls Clubs of America, serving as a Regional Trustee between 1998 and 2017. Cal traveled across the country, visiting different Clubs and observing how Clubs were delivering programming to youth and families. Cal observed that many Clubs were isolated from schools, making it difficult for children to attend

To ensure access for all youth, Cal founded BGCGCV in 2001 to build full Clubhouse facilities on middle school campuses. At the time, Cal envisioned starting six Clubs in the Conejo area. Today, BGCGCV runs nine Clubs serving thousands of members every year across Los Angeles and Ventura counties.

Rising Stronger: OUR RESPONSE TO THE COVID-19 CRISIS Stay Stay


In 2020, BGCGCV focused on doing everything we could to support our youth, families, and employees coping with, and emerging from, the COVID-19 pandemic whole and even more resilient than before the crisis hit.

BGCGCV kept Clubs open because we believe parents should not have to choose between earning an income and ensuring their child is educated. Vulnerable children should not have to experience hunger, be left alone, or trail behind academically.

In March, we were able to keep four of our Clubs open for the remainder of the 2019-2020 school year, despite all the challenges and new requirements due to COVID. We were also able to open up two additional Clubs for summer and fall programming, totaling six Club sites across Ventura and Los Angeles counties. We spent the year actively working to maintain a sense of routine, prevent learning loss, and enabling families to continue to economically support themselves. We also provided 100% of staff the opportunity to continue working in 2020 if they felt comfortable doing so. We provided regular organizational updates and individualized social-emotional coaching to our staff to ensure their well-being while offering proper support to our Clubs' youth and families.

Our COVID work did not stop with the new year. We continue to educate our elected officials around the needs of our youth, families, and community. We are also working closely with public school districts to ensure that our Clubs can support youth and family needs throughout the new school year for both in-person and online formats.

Keeping Youth Safe: Physically and Emotionally

BGCGCV Clubs are designed to keep youth safe, both physically and emotionally, and we prioritize a culture of safety.

Our highly trained staff understand how important it is to create inclusive spaces where members feel like they belong. Whether a member needs support to escape abuse at home. fight discrimination due to sexuality or race, overcome trauma. or feel like they can't find their niche, they have a place at Club.

It was this commitment to safety that helped us support our youth and families effectively in 2020.

Club safety plans include:

- Criminal background checks for each staff and volunteer, a confidential 24-hour toll-free Child Safety Hotline, and email
- Ongoing child safety training
- 100% adherence to high national Boys & Girls Clubs of America safety standards



DID YOU KNOW?

50% of kids surveyed felt more anxious and stressed during the pandemic, but having access to staff they could talk to and trust helped them self-manage their stress.

COVID SAFETY

BGCGCV takes the utmost precaution to keep our members safe. All Clubs operate in 100% compliance with federal, state, regional, and local safety and cleaning regulations.

Members are placed in small, consistent monthly cohorts to minimize exposure and maintain a clean and safe space during the pandemic. Temperature taking, hand washing, and masking are required and observed consistently.

As a result, BGCGCV has had ZERO cases of COVID transmission in our Clubs.



Access to Safe and Supportive Services

Depending on the Club, up to 80% of members received a scholarship to attend.

SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL SAFETY

Our focus and organizational mandate in 2020 was to ensure our members had socially and emotionally supportive environments that they could depend on. To do so, BGCGCV intentionally implemented social-emotional learning (SEL) by:

- Paying close **attention to the feelings of stress** or anxiety of our youth members and their families.
- Acknowledging and supporting our members in processing their full range of emotions and concerns while offering calm reassurance and age-appropriate problem-solving strategies.
- Providing age-appropriate information and accurate answers to questions about the news while limiting social media during club hours.
- Providing consistency in daily routines, including healthy meals and nurturing academic support.
- Practicing patience and structure when routines were disrupted.
- Designing activities to help our youth members think of creative ways to maintain their friendships and social connections despite isolation.
- **Utilizing fun alternatives** to show signs of affection and encouragement while minimizing the spread of germs.
- Proactively reaching out to schools and community organizations to support our youth experiencing more acute levels of anxiety, stress or trauma, while maintaining privacy for the youth and family.

FIRST TIME GOING TO STATE

The Youth of the Year program celebrates the remarkable lives of Boys & Girls Clubs of Conejo Valley members who have distinguished themselves by rising above challenging circumstances. Each Club chooses two candidates as their Youth of the Year nominee based on their active involvement in their Club or camp, service to their community, commitment to education, and healthy behavior mentoring for younger Club members. Candidates share how the Club impacted their life, the challenges they faced, how they overcame challenges, and what they learned from their experiences through persuasive public speaking, a written essay, and interviews with an esteemed panel of judges.

For the first time in BGCGCV history, our Club member went on to win California Coastal Youth of the Year! BGCGCV Club member Renique McNeil was named 2020 14 and Up Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Conejo Valley Youth and 2020 Boys & Girls Clubs' California Coastal Youth of the Year.
